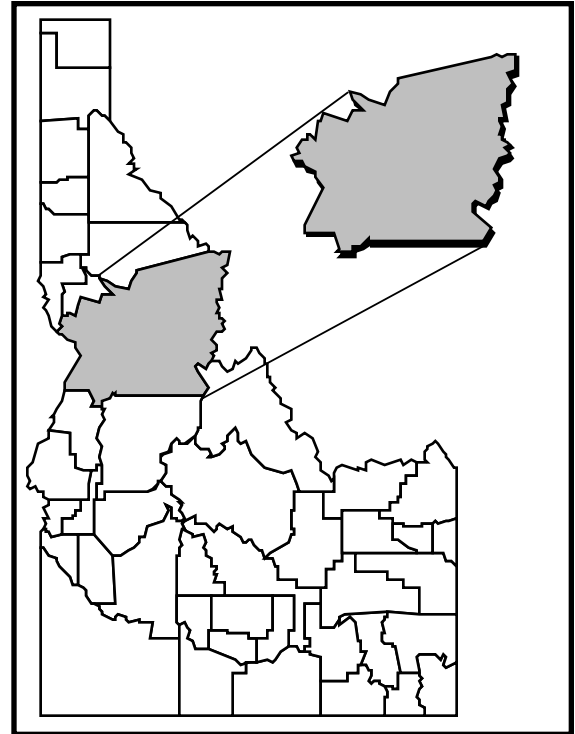

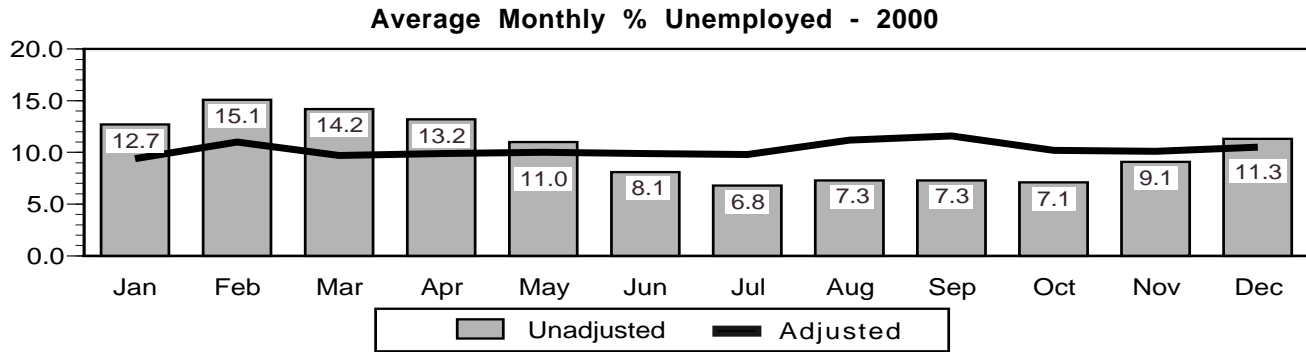

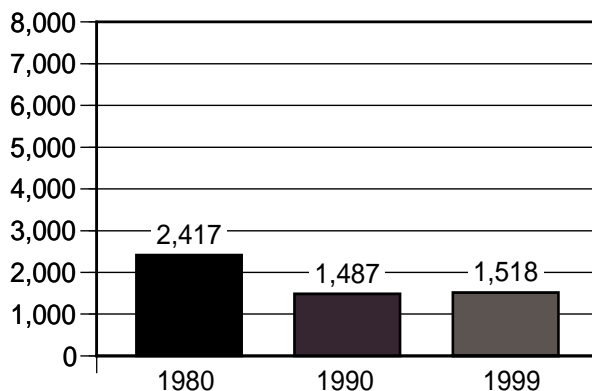

Crime - Number of Offenses

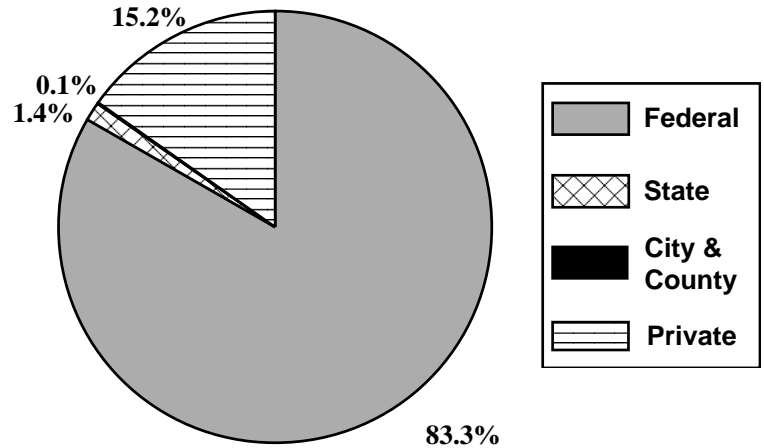

Idaho County is located in north-central Idaho, bordering Oregon and Montana. It ranks 19th among Idaho counties in population, and 1st in area. The federal government owns over 83 percent of the county. Forest products manufacturing and agriculture are the basic industries, but government is the largest employment sector. Substantial employment also is provided by trade and services. Annual average total civilian employment decreased 1.3 percent from 1990 to 2000. Major employers include Three Rivers Timber, Cottonwood School District, Grangeville School District, the U.S. Forest Service, Idaho County government, and St. Mary's Hospital.

The county contains the Selway-Bitterroot Wilderness Area, the Gospel Hump Wilderness area, the Frank Church River of No Return Wilderness Area, and a large part of the Hells Canyon National Recreation Area. Approximately 165 miles of the nation's longest free-flowing river (the Salmon) wind through Idaho County. Also of note are the Nez Perce National Historic Park and the Lolo Indian Trail that Lewis and Clark followed.
